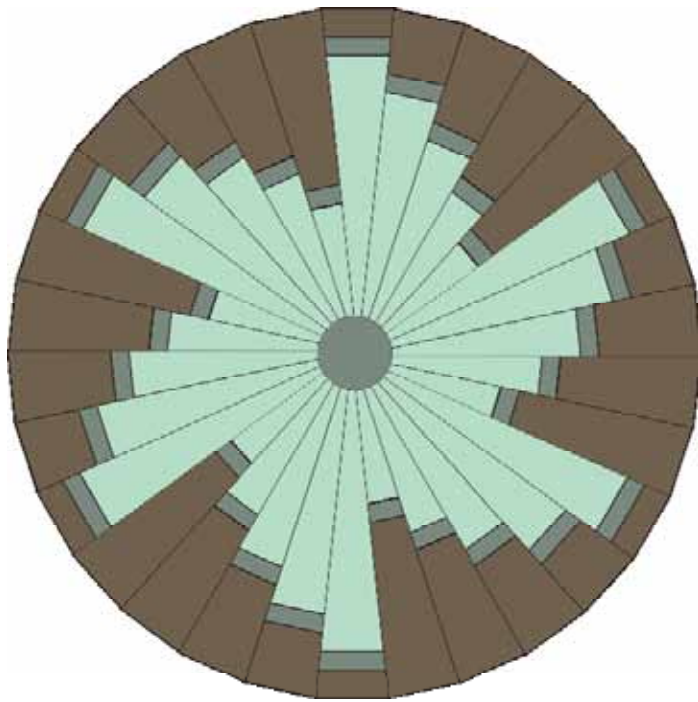
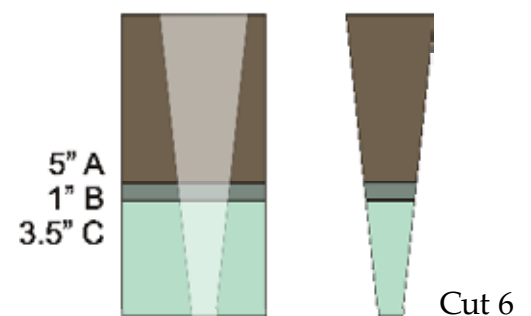
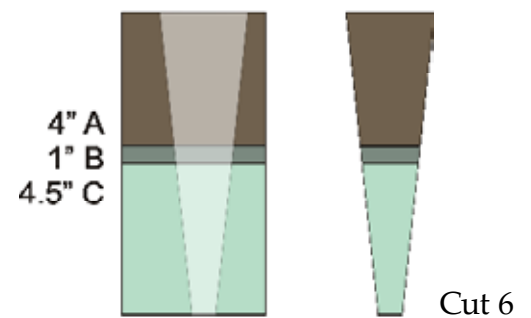
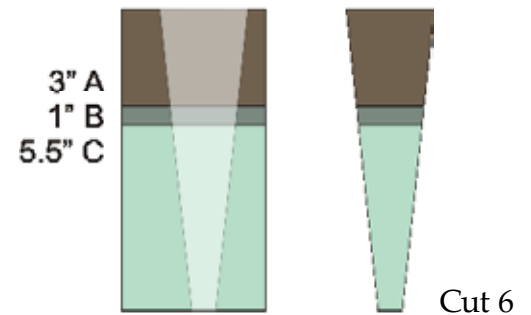
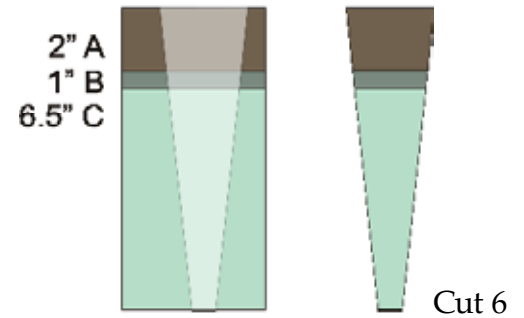
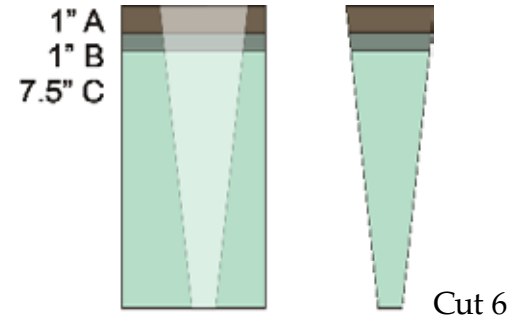


The 12 Degree Spinning Circle



Fabric	exact amount	suggested yardage	fat quarters
A	8" x full width	$\frac{1}{3}$ yd	1 fat
B	3" x full width	$\frac{1}{4}$ yd	1 fat
C	14" x full width	$\frac{1}{3}$ yd	2 fats



Cutting

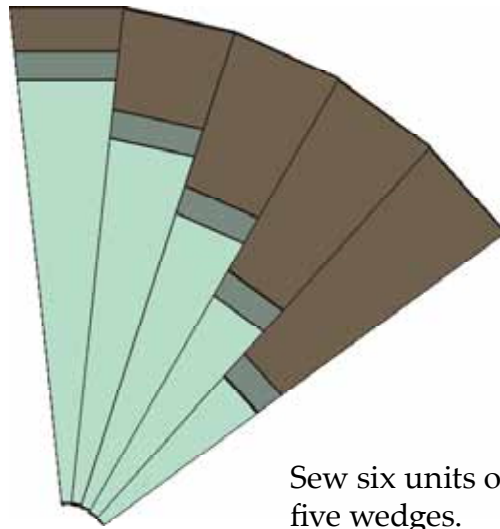
	Fabric	half width strip (~20-22")
A	A	one 1" wide strip
		one 2" wide strip
		one 3" wide strip
		one 4" wide strip
		one 5" wide strip
B	B	five 1" wide strips
		one 3" square
C	C	one 3 ½" wide strip
		one 4 ½" wide strip
		one 5 ½" wide strip
		one 6 ½" wide strip
		one 7 ½" wide strip

- Cut fabric strips. Note strips are only half the fabric width, making it an ideal project for fat quarters.
- Sew the strips together to make strip sets.
- Iron seam allowances toward the A fabric.
- Place the 12 degree wedge tool onto the strip set and cut six wedges per strip.

Note: If you find your strip set too narrow too cut the full wedge, cut from the wide end. You will need to increase the size of the center applique. If too wide, trim around each wedge as needed.

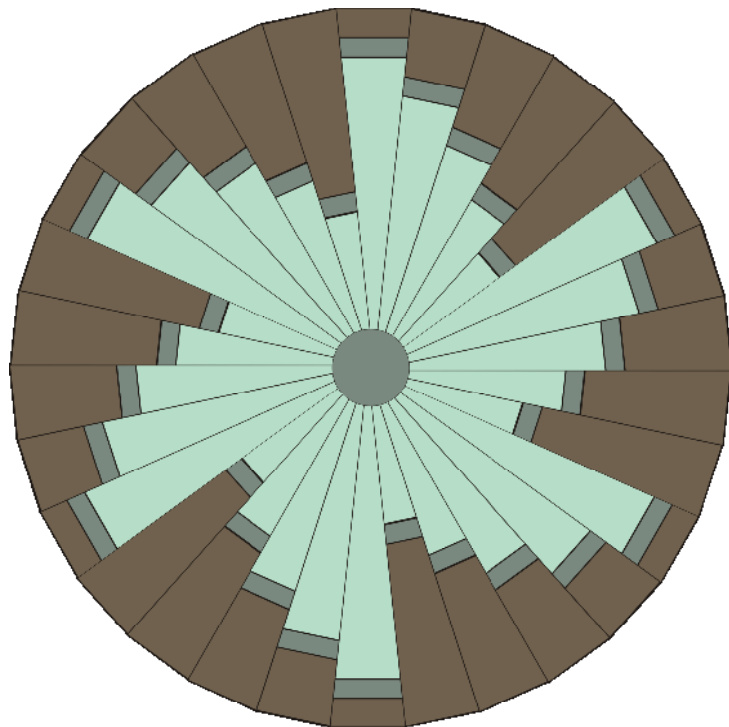
The 12 Degree Spinning Circle

- Sew wedges together in units of **five** wedges.
- Sew **six identical** units.

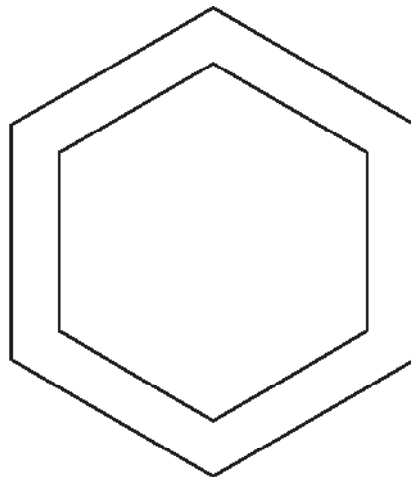
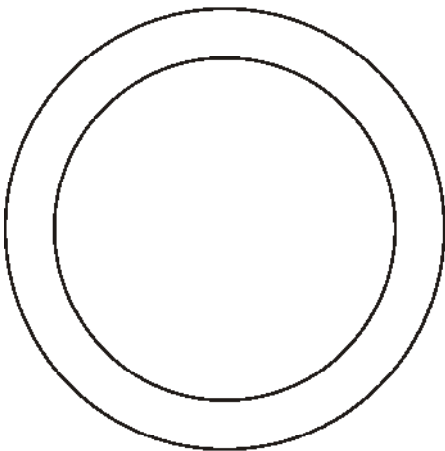


Sew six units of five wedges.

- Sew the six units together to form a circle.
- Press the wedge seam allowances in a counter-clock wise direction.



- Trace the circle onto freezer paper to make an applique with the 3" Fabric B square.
- Applique the circle in the center of the pieced circle. A hexagon can be substituted for the circle.



What can you with your circle?

Your Spinning Circle makes a great table topper. Make it in spring colors to give your table a fresh look.

Your Spinning Circle makes a great pillow. Perhaps add a ruffle or pleated edging.

Your Spinning Circle would make a great tote bag. Make two circles, line and sew together. Add a colorful strap handle.
